MEDIA STATEMENT BY THE SOUTH AFRICAN LAW REFORM COMMISSION (SALRC) ON ITS

**INVESTIGATION INTO TRAFFICKING IN PERSONS (PROJECT 131)** 

The SALRC releases its Report on Trafficking in Persons which contains the SALRC's final

recommendations and a draft Bill.

The SALRC's investigation forms part of the South African government's response to the phenomenon of

trafficking in persons. More specifically, the investigation seeks to enhance government's compliance with

its international obligations as a State Party to the United Nations Protocol on Trafficking in Persons. The

Protocol provides that each State Party must adopt legislative measures to criminalise the trafficking of

persons.

The Report addresses three main aspects, namely the prevention of trafficking in persons, the prosecution

of traffickers and other role-players, and the protection of victims of trafficking. In summary, the Report

provides for:

The establishment of public awareness programs or other measures for the prevention of

trafficking in persons.

The criminalisation of trafficking in persons and related acts such as subjecting a victim of

trafficking to debt bondage, and destroying or confiscating the travel documents of victims of

trafficking.

Protective measures such as avenues for the reporting and referral of child and adult victims of

trafficking respectively, a recovery and reflection period which will allow foreign adults certified as

victims of trafficking to stay in the country for up to 90 days, immunity from prosecution for crimes

committed as a direct result of being a victim of trafficking and the repatriation of victims of

trafficking in terms of a process that takes cognisance of their safety not only during the

repatriation process, but also in the countries to which they are to be returned or when returned to

South Africa.

The accreditation of organisations to provide certain services to adult victims of trafficking.

Compensation to victims of trafficking for physical or psychological injury or for being infected with

a life-threatening disease.
